2019 is an eventful year for Ukraine. Five years after Russia's annexation of Crimea and the beginning of the still ongoing Donbass War, Ukrainians are electing at the end of March a new President and a few months later a new parliament. Many observers expect that this 'super election year' will have sweeping consequences for Ukraine and will shape to the way of the country's urgently needed reform process.

Ukraine is facing numerous challenges. Thus far, the political reforms have been only partially implemented and the power of the oligarchs which held Ukraine in grip in the past is still strong. Parts of Eastern Ukraine are occupied by pro-Russian separatists, Crimea is increasingly interwoven with Russia, and the recent events in the Sea of Azov underlines that the danger of escalation is high and real.

But despite these challenges, Ukraine has not succumbed and the country has noticeably changed in the last five years. Civil society is strong and diverse and is actively involved in political and social processes at many levels. Ukraine has become more open and more closely intertwined with other European countries than ever before.

It is the goal of this conference to explore and discuss in which direction Ukraine is heading in the future. In particular, we will elaborate about several ways and means how Western Europe – and in particular Germany – could further support the country's transition.

9:30 **PLENARY DISCUSSION | Taking Stock – The War in Eastern Ukraine and the Diplomatic Efforts to Stop it**

In 2019 the Donbass War in Ukraine will enter its fifth year. Over 12.000 people have been killed, 3,300 of them civilians, and 1.5 million displaced. In light of these drastic developments, the impact of the Minsk II agreement – negotiated in February 2015 and until today the central diplomatic framework for the handling of the difficult conflict situation in Eastern Ukraine – appears meager and improvable. The purpose of this plenary panel is to take stock of the diplomatic efforts undertaken so far. How is the situation today? What are the expectations for the future?
