How Does Digitization Affect Conflict Transformation – and vice versa?

Annual Conference of the German Platform for Peaceful Conflict Transformation

Protestant Academy Loccum, 21-23 April 2023

The corona pandemic has triggered a significant surge in digitization in almost all areas of life. At the same time, the great optimism that was once felt toward digital technologies has increasingly faded. Whether social media, digital identities, AI, geospatial information, blockchain, or big data - these technologies not only promote transnational exchange, democratization, and peace. Rather, the digital transformation has progressed particularly in the area of conflict and violence as well as the autocratic abuse of power. In addition, digitization is believed to be inherently conflict-ridden due to the fundamental upheavals it will cause in the mode of economic production, power relations, and interpersonal exchange.

Despite all this disillusionment, the field of digital peacemaking has increasingly established itself in recent years. Through the innovative handling of digitization at the interface between the online and offline world, positive experience was gained for crisis prevention, conflict management, and peacebuilding. However, these activities currently lag far behind the malign, autocratic, and peace-threatening application of digital technologies.

The conference aims to shed light on how conflict management and digitization influence each other. Analyzing this nexus will bring an answer to the question of what practical and political conclusions can be drawn for the further development of the field of civil conflict management. German-English simultaneous translation will be offered in all plenary discussions.

The interrelationship between conflict and digitization is complex. Whether cyberattacks, hate speech or digital authoritarianism – real-world crises and conflicts have nowadays a significant digital dimension. 5.00 p.m. **EXPLORATORY SESSION | Conflict and the Digital Space – What conceptual and analytical approaches to crises, conflicts, and violent events arise at the interface between the offline and online world?**

Conflicts are highly digitized today. At the same time, digitization processes repeatedly lead to conflicts. So, there is a complex nexus between conflict and the digital space. The panel aims to illuminate this nexus focusing thereby on analytical and conceptual approaches and asking – among others – the following questions: How do conflicts occur in the digital space and what digital and real-world effects result from it? Which knowledge about crises, conflicts, and peace concepts can be transferred from the offline to the online world - and vice versa?

In order to explore the interface between conflict and digital space, an introductory impulse panel will take place in the first part. In the second part, the discussion is then continued in parallel forums, which are tailored along four fundamental levels of conflictual events in digital space - the individual, social, material, and ideal dimensions.

Digital peacebuilding is a relatively young field of activity. Nevertheless, relevant practical experience has already been gained in recent years and initial analytical evaluations have been carried out. Both opportunities and risks of digital peacebuilding were identified and a series of crucial questions are waiting for an answer – such as: How can the transition from digital inclusion to digital agency be managed? How can digital peacebuilding be applied without falling into the trap of "tech solutionism"? How to deal with the trade-off between "digital accessibility" and "digital security"? How can a people-centered "local first" approach be implemented well in the digital space? How to deal with the platform dependency? How to strike the right balance between offline and online approaches? Etc.

The establishment of digital peacebuilding as a crucial field of conflict management will be facilitated if convincing answers are found to these questions. This orientation panel aims to compile the opportunities and risks of digital peacebuilding as comprehensively as possible.

- Over the past few decades, civil conflict management has shown its competence in numerous fields and has developed a rich set of methods for dealing with crises, conflicts, and violent events. Part of this experience can be applied to conflicts in the digital space – however, adaptations and adjustments are required. The opportunities as well as the risks that were brought together in the previous panel need to be taken into account. Four areas of civil conflict management are particularly suitable for transfer to the online world: (1) Dialog und Meditation (2) Early Warning, Monitoring and Documentation (3) Empowerment and Qualification (4) Pro Peace Messaging, Communication and Awareness Raising
